Through Pictures, a child...

Reading a Picture is an active experience in which a child may see new things, interpret past experiences, or consider what could happen in another situation.

Using Pictures to Teach

- Read a Bible verse and let children choose a picture that matches its meaning.
- Display family photos and invite children to share or find pictures of activities they enjoy at home.
- Use pictures to explain customs and daily life in simple, age-appropriate terms.
- Sing a song and let children select a picture that relates to the words.
- Arrange story pictures in order and encourage children to retell the story.
- Play music while children walk around viewing displayed pictures; ask them to find or describe specific ones.
- Create matching picture cards for a memory game.
- Turn Bible story pictures into simple puzzles (magnetic pieces, Velcro boards, or laminated cutouts).
- Place a Bible or everyday picture on the floor and invite children to draw or dictate something about it;

VALUES of USING PICTURES

Pictures are indispensable for enriching experiences for young children about the Bible, God's creation, self, community, God, Jesus, church, family, and the world.

- Pictures help children recognize familiar people, places, and things.
- Pictures connect children to real-life situations and environments.
- Pictures offer substitute experiences when direct ones aren't possible.
- Pictures spark conversations and reveal how children view the world.
- Pictures show children doing activities they can relate to.
- Pictures create an atmosphere of worship and point children to God.
- Pictures inspire children to tell or create stories.
- Pictures encourage positive behavior by modeling kindness and cooperation.
- Pictures strengthen sequencing, sorting, and classification skills.
- Pictures nurture curiosity and exploration.

Displaying Pictures:

- <u>For Younger Preschool</u> place pictures in cribs or on the floor for easy access.
- <u>For Older Preschool</u> place pictures at eye level; create themed displays or use binder rings to create picture books

Rotate Pictures regularly so they stay fresh and meaningful. Place them at a child's eye level where preschoolers can engage with them directly.
